Message from the President and Chief Executive Officer

We had the privilege of meeting and talking with the staff and residents in many of our care homes. More visits are planned and we hope that we can finish visits to all our homes in the coming months.

While we continue to monitor COVID in our communities, we are

grateful to have gotten back to some “normal” activities. In August, we held two fundraising golf tournaments in Lethbridge and Edmonton. They were last held in 2019. These two events allow Good Samaritans to connect with our local community partners and other supporters as well as contribute to our New Initiatives in Care Excellence (NICE) program.

Many people know of my heritage and my hope to continue advancing the work of Truth and Reconciliation at Good Samaritan. The dates June 21 and September 30 are important for Canadians and mark our journey towards reconciliation with Indigenous peoples. While we commemorated National Indigenous Peoples Day in June and will recognize the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation on September 30, Good Samaritans should consider what we can do to help people feel like they belong and feel safe. We all have a role to play in reconciliation.

As we can start to see the changing fall colours, it is a good reminder that “change” is all around and we must be prepared to embrace it. If the pandemic has taught anything, it is that we may need to pivot if the situation requires it. At Good Samaritan we have the right team, Board and programs to adjust as we face new challenges. It is a great time to be a Good Samaritan!

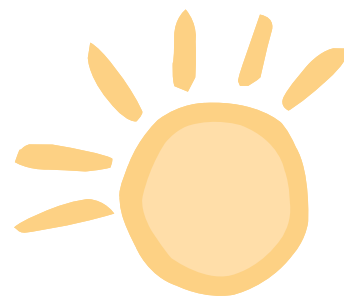

Remembering Jack Lymer

This past April, The Good Samaritan Society was saddened to learn of the passing of John Robert Lymer, known to many Good Samaritans simply as, Jack. The beloved husband, father, grandfather, and uncle was 87 years old, and had been a constant presence and

guiding force within the Society for over five decades.

Jack Lymer's career as a Good Samaritan began on July 1, 1967, when he became the Head Pharmacist for the Good Samaritan Auxiliary Hospital (now the Dr. Gerald Zetter Care Centre). After becoming a trusted and respected figure within the Hospital over the subsequent years, Lymer became the Hospital Administrator in 1972. Before long, he was promoted to Executive Vice President of the Society, working closely with then-President and CEO Phil Gaudet. Lymer remained a valued member of the leadership team until his retirement in 1994.

Although Jack's contributions to the Society were vast, he will perhaps be best remembered for his role in the creation of TeleCare. He was instrumental in identifying the need for a 24-hour emergency response service, and worked tirelessly to make the vision a reality. Good Samaritan Lifeline began accepting

subscribers in 1987, and as the program evolved into the TeleCare we know today, Jack remained at the forefront. Even after his retirement, Jack remained a dedicated volunteer for TeleCare, logging nearly 2000 hours installing systems between 1995 and 2019. His kind demeanour and helpful nature provided peace of mind for countless clients while setting the benchmark for servant leadership and client-centred care throughout the TeleCare program. In 2010, he was honoured as a recipient of the Seniors and Community Support Award from the Government of Alberta.

With 52 years of service to The Good Samaritan Society, it's truly impossible to overstate Jack's selfless dedication to others. His kindness, generosity, and embodiment of Good Samaritan's values will be remembered fondly by those who knew him, while his profoundly positive impact on the Society will be felt forever.



Remembering George Hennig



Good Samaritans were saddened to learn of the passing of former president George Hennig in July 2022. The devoted father, grandfather, brother, uncle, and servant of the community was 95 years old.

George Hennig began his career as a Good Samaritan in 1955, sitting on the Board of Directors for the then-Lutheran Home Society. He served faithfully on the Board until 1963 before becoming chair of the Good Samaritan Hospital Board. In 1964, he was asked by the Board to accept the duties of hospital administrator. He said, "I've spent so much time at the hospital I might as well get paid for it." Indeed, Hennig spent countless hours volunteering at the hospital on top of his duties, a practice he continued throughout his career.

George remained a guiding force for the hospital until September 1967, when he was appointed as the Executive Director of the Lutheran Home Society. His administrative skills and dedication to the Good Samaritan vision made him the logical choice to oversee the Society's three facilities: the Auxiliary Hospital, the Mount Pleasant nursing home, and a soon-to-be-completed residence in Stony Plain that would later bear his name.

In 1969, the Lutheran Home Society became The Good Samaritan Society, earning recognition in the community for its dedication, integrity, faith, and compassion. Serving as Chief Executive Officer and President, George led the Society through a period of enormous growth, adding a range of facilities, including care homes, independent housing for seniors, group homes for the disabled, and additional outreach services (such

as TeleCare). Before his retirement in 1989, George was honoured with a Distinguished Citation Award from the City of Edmonton, a Distinguished Service Award from the Alberta Hospital Association, and a Government of Alberta Achievement Award for exceptional contributions to his profession.

Throughout his 34 years of service to the Society, George Hennig truly embodied what it means to be a Good Samaritan. His unwavering commitment to compassionate care allowed The Good Samaritan Society to thrive over the decades, with his legacy becoming the very foundation on which our organization continues to flourish today.

George Hennig is survived by daughters and sons-in-law Barbara and Dale, Brenda and Dwayne, and caring companion Eva Witen, along with grandchildren Hilary, Jeff, and Jennifer, their spouses, and families.

ROOTED in What's Right: The Good Samaritan Way

The air is dry, the land is barren, and the heat is overwhelming. This is the middle of the Arabian Desert, a vast wilderness spanning 2.3 million square kilometres, far from the ideal playground for those with a green thumb or aspiring horticulturalists among us. Be that as it may, journey 40 kilometres outside of the capital city of Bahrain, Manama, and an awesome sight will capture your attention and spark wonder.

On a hill for all to see is a spectacle that draws thousands of people every year, who marvel in its shadow. There stands the Shajarat-al-Hayat, The Tree of Life, nearly 10 metres high, exuberantly green, and over 400 years old. Surrounded by sand as far as the eyes can see, this tree is a ripe image of hope – a sign that with the right root system, life can thrive in the face of adversity. One of the prominent theories on

how this is possible is connected to the elaborate root systems that scientists believe to stretch 50 metres beneath the surface capable of reaching deep beds of underground water.¹ Defying the odds and being a catalyst for life is most certainly connected to a vibrant root system. This, is remarkably similar to the Good Samaritan way.

Good Samaritan healthcare providers, and society as a whole have endured the blowing sands of hardship over these past two years. Facing and navigating adversity has always been a reality within healthcare environments but the

presence of a global pandemic exasperated that reality. Simultaneously, there have been and continue to be difference-makers that has brought Good Samaritan to this place in time, 73 years after Mr. Gottlieb Wedman made an investment in faith to launch the Good Samaritan Auxiliary Hospital to provide care and refuge for seniors in need. It is the same root-system that will ground us and keep us thriving as we dream, plan, and work towards the future. Our roots are deep and vital to our identity. To be rooted in what's right is to be rooted in our Mission, Vision, and Values.

Our faith-based identity reminds us that the care we provide to those in need is a reflection of the value and dignity God has placed in humanity and an extension of love that is best served without condition. In the proverbial soil of the heart and soul of Good Samaritan is where our care is enriched and nourished for the mission.

An old testament writer, Jeremiah, describes the importance of our roots to our work of care. He says,

But blessed are those who trust in the Lord and have made the Lord their hope and confidence. They are like trees planted along a riverbank, with roots that reach deep into the water. Such trees are not bothered by the heat or worried by long months of drought. Their leaves stay green, and they never stop producing fruit. - Jeremiah 17:7-8 (NLT)²

What a poignant reminder that where we are planted matters and how critical the health of our root systems are. As the winds of the latest health crisis show up fierce and unexpectedly; as the realities of staffing shortages are carried with the model of care we hold as a standard; as every one of us faces the heat of pressures that life inevitably brings our way; as any other unimaginable challenge arrives at our doorstep, our ability to rise above and continue forward, together, is directly tied to our roots. In the presence of trial, there can be triumph. The Good Samaritan story can be one of resilience rooted in what's right.

These roots go deep. They stretch back to the quiet moment where a Leduc farmer sensed God sowing a seed for impact, planting a dream in his heart. These roots connect every single donor who selflessly gave of their own resources to better life for another. They are interwoven in the soil of countless volunteer hours that have been invested to lift others. You see them at the many board tables over the decades through countless leaders who have leveraged their voice, experience, and skills to lead Good Samaritan forward. These roots are what connect every staff member throughout the Good Samaritan family regardless of their role or location.

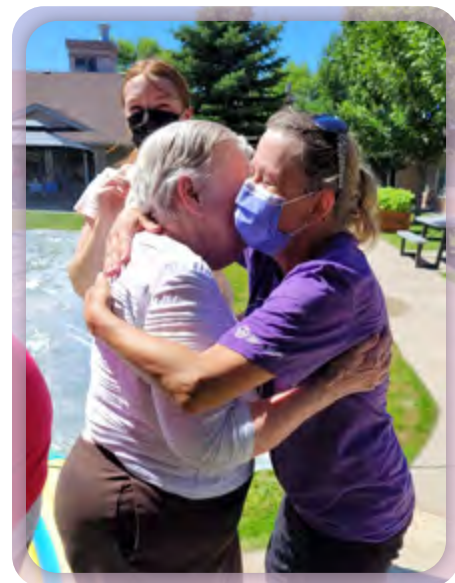

September 13 is Founder's Day for the Good Samaritan Society and Good Samaritan Canada, marking 73 years dedicated to providing care for those who need it most. It's a day for celebration; not many organizations can lay claim to over seven decades of service to the community! It's also a cause for reflection on the hard work, values, and dedication that have guided us on our journey thus far.

In 1949, Gottlieb Wedman, a Leduc farmer, saw the need for a seniors' home in his community and donated \$7000 to the Lutheran Church. By 1955, that donation, along with the help of many volunteers and community

fundraising, led to the opening of the Good Samaritan Auxiliary Hospital. It was the first step towards expansion of services and care homes across western Canada, providing much-needed support for thousands of seniors and individuals in need.

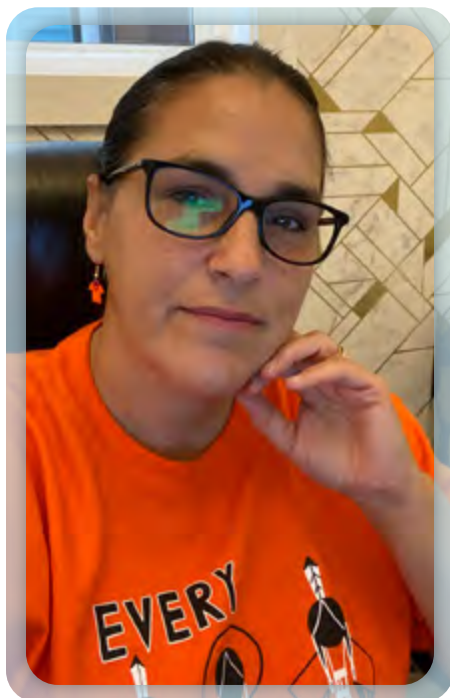
Since those early days, the Society has grown considerably. Today, we serve over 6,000 individuals annually with programs and care homes across Alberta and British Columbia. Though the ways in which we serve have evolved over time, our Mission, Vision, and Values have remained true to Wedman's passion for providing Christian Hospitality to those in



need. Just as his donation ultimately became a lifeline to his community, our organization continues to grow in strength, excellence, and creativity in caring for others. By creating hospitable relationships, cultivating healthy environments, and embodying servant leadership in all that we do, we honour the legacy of our founders while continuing to move forward in the next chapter of our history.

Understanding Mission Engagement and Chaplaincy

Chaplaincy within our organization looks quite a bit different today than it did originally. In the beginning, our chaplains were effectively “pastors in residence,” responsible only for looking after residents’ religious needs. While our organization’s history is full of leaders who went above and beyond to provide the care our residents need, the core purpose of the chaplain was to serve as an extension of the Church in a clinical care setting.

As the world around us has evolved, so have the religious and spiritual needs of our residents. To help meet these needs, the role of chaplaincy at Good Samaritan has evolved as well. Today’s chaplains are clinically-trained professionals with religious, philosophical, and social science backgrounds. They provide support, encouragement, guidance, and a host of other services to residents and staff alike. As part of the Mission Engagement team, chaplains serve on annual initiatives, committees, working groups and projects, as well as engaging community members and partners on behalf of your community.



Pastoral Care

Pastoral care and programming is only one of the chaplain’s responsibilities, but it is still absolutely essential to fulfilling our mission and caring for our residents.

Services that chaplaincy provides include worship, hymn sings, and Bible studies, all of which are used and appreciated by many of our residents. One resident recently commented that “while [their] physical needs are well cared for, and [their] social desires are met, [they] value the encouragement provided for my spirit, the real me, through the visits and the services of the chaplain. This helps through the challenges of daily living.”

Pastoral services help residents connect to God, each other, and the community at large. As we all know, the pandemic has impacted the delivery of these services. However, our chaplaincy team remains dedicated to finding innovative ways to keep residents connected to their spiritual community.



Clinical Care

Today's chaplains are healthcare professionals. The typical Good Samaritan chaplain has a master's degree, denominational endorsement, followed by specific training in institutional chaplaincy known as clinical pastoral education (CPE). Our chaplains are trained with the knowledge and skills to provide chaplaincy to residents in a clinical or institutional setting.

Our chaplains take a holistic approach to care. By reflecting on grief, celebrations, and spiritual connections, we aim to nurture a sense of Being and Belonging in every interaction with residents, staff, and community. Chaplains use spiritual assessments of residents outlining the things that hold the deepest personal meanings and values, using this knowledge to engage the entire healthcare team in physical, social, and spiritual care. In many ways, our chaplains are responsible for ensuring the entire person is looked after, both inside and out.



Community Care

At its foundation, chaplaincy is rooted in community. Collaborating with faith communities and leaders, our chaplains work to provide meaningful care in the diverse traditions of all our residents. We are grateful to all our community partners and the many ways chaplains engage these team members in enhancing resident comfort.

During the pandemic, regular community partner visits were suspended, but they continued to participate with the support of the chaplains. Whether it's coordinating communion supplies with local faith leaders or gathering letters from the community for residents to read, our chaplaincy team continues to foster meaningful connections between our residents and the communities they call home.

The Future of Chaplaincy

The role of chaplaincy and day-to-day duties of our chaplains will undoubtedly change over time. However, one thing that will remain the same is our commitment to providing total Spiritual Care for our residents.

Spiritual Care is all about providing meaningful support in ways that resonate with our residents. Cultivating spirituality gives meaning and purpose to life, and helps build positive relationships with self, other people, nature, music, or a higher power. Providing this support is an extension of our mission statement: "to extend Christian Hospitality through a continuum of care to those in need or at risk, regardless of race or religious belief." Christian Hospitality is about welcoming the stranger, the person in need, and empowering them to lead a spiritually full life. Our chaplains, along with the rest of the Mission Engagement team, will continue to find meaningful ways to foster this connection with our residents, staff, and community at large.

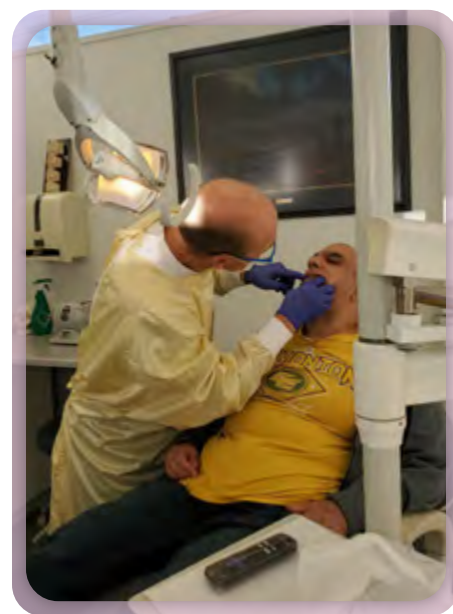

Arthur Fabian and the Rehabilitation and Therapeutic Teams planned the logistics of the walk to make sure all residents and staff could safely participate. "Our teams and the residents were excited about this," Fabian said. "We

Lethbridge Therapeutic Riding Association Horsing Around in Southern Alta.

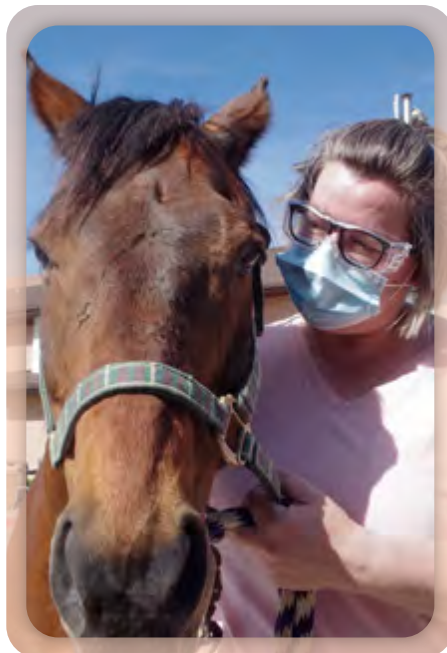
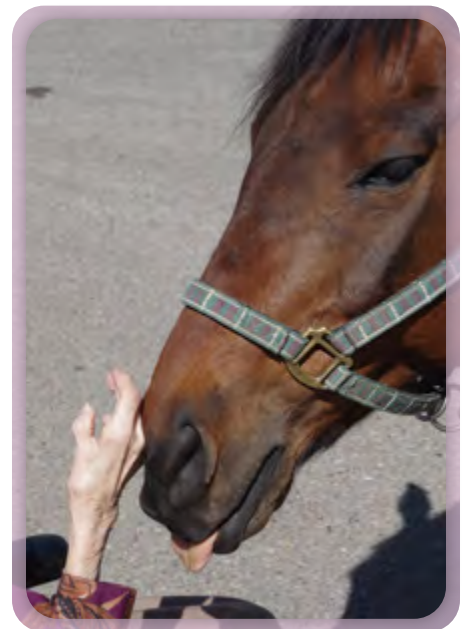
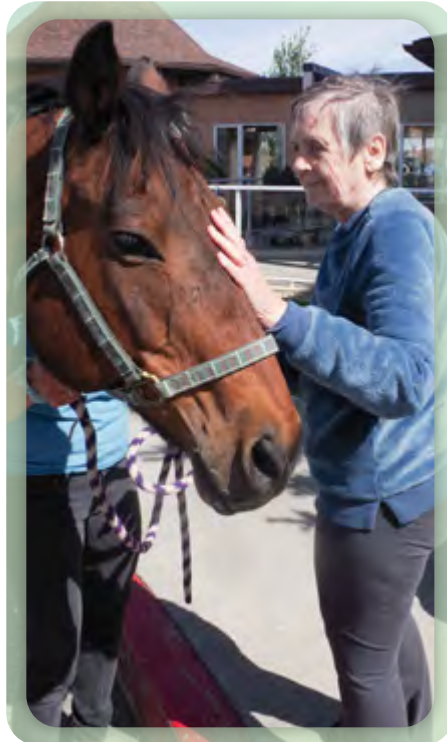
